UPDATES FROM TEXAS LIONS CAMP

1. Registration of Campers: We have over 800 campers fully enrolled and all paperwork filed. However, we still have about 200 applications that are incomplete. That means that something in their application is not finished. So, they are close to being enrolled, but not fully enrolled yet. We have plenty of room in our 2-5 weeks of physical disability. We have waiting list status for our weeks for campers with Down syndrome and type-1 diabetes.
2. What does it take to be a Lion Sponsor for a camper? (1) You must be a Lion in good standing in your club. (2) You must sign the application Lions Sponsor Form for your camper. (3) You must make sure that your camper has transportation to camp. If you are unsure if a child's medical condition qualifies them to attend TLC, call the TLC registrar at (830)896-8500. That's it. Find a camper and start your legacy of changing lives, one camper at a time.
3. Anyone and everyone is invited to attend TLC Awards night each Friday night of the summer starting June 15th, and except for July 27th. Come and celebrate with the campers, counselors, staff and families the goals reached throughout the week. Festivities located in the TLC Amphitheater begin at 7:30 pm and are usually over by 9 pm.
4. The beginning of summer usually means the end of the Lion Year. Make sure that you remember those special members of your club who have gone the extra mile this past year with a special award from Texas Lions Camp. Give that newest member a TLC Life Membership, or your outgoing president a Jack Wiech Award. Give an honorarium donation on behalf of someone who has brought in the most new members or perhaps a memorial for those members who have passed this last year. It is easy to do something great for your club and change the lives of campers at the same time. **Also remember that club dues, 100% and any other donations that are to be accounted for in the 2017-18 year need to be to the camp by June 30th.**
5. Though the Summer Volunteer Opportunities are filled for 2018, make plans now to register for Summer 2019 during the registration time in October. If your club is interested in serving a picnic lunch or dinner, or a watermelon party, host a refreshment stand or be an awards night host, remember to go to www.lionscamp.com on October 1, 2018 and begin your registration. We keep registration open for 2 weeks before spinning a lottery and assigning opportunities. If your club is not of a size that you think you can handle some of these projects, combine with another club in your district and work together to get the job done.

25 Project Ideas for Diabetes Awareness and Action

1. Organize a “Strides: Lions for Diabetes Awareness” event in your community.
2. Organize a community support group for parents of children with diabetes.
3. Volunteer to serve at a children’s camp for diabetes.
4. Invite a healthcare professional to speak about diabetes at your club or district meeting.
5. Support your nearest diabetes foundation.
6. Partner with local healthcare providers to organize diabetes and vision screenings.
7. Distribute current educational resources to increase diabetes awareness at a community health fair or other event.
8. Organize a walking club for seniors with diabetes.
9. Provide a diabetes magazine subscription to your local library.
10. Sponsor a child in need to attend a diabetes camp.
11. Donate current diabetes books to your local library and insert a bookplate to identify your club’s donation.
12. Participate in World Diabetes Day events on November 14.
13. Work with your local school to invite a health care professional to speak about diabetes.
14. Post monthly articles about diabetes on your club or district website.
15. Promote diabetes prevention through a radio public service announcement.
16. Sponsor a healthy cooking demonstration for people with diabetes.
17. Organize a school or community vegetable garden to encourage healthy eating.

18. Work with a community podiatrist or foot care specialist to provide foot screenings.
19. Work with health care professionals to provide “at-risk” populations in your community with screenings and educational materials.
20. Partner with your local diabetes organization to offer programs and materials.
21. Promote community resources and materials available online from LCI partner organizations (NDEP, DECA and IDF).
22. Hold a fundraiser for a local diabetes camp or foundation.
23. Provide financial assistance to people in need to help them obtain medicine and supplies for the management of their diabetes.
24. Promote the importance of an annual dilated eye exam to detect diabetic eye disease.
25. Provide translated diabetes educational materials to schools, libraries and physician offices.

25 Project Ideas for Engaging our Youth

1. Organize a youth forum or town hall meeting to highlight topics that youth have identified as critical community issues.
2. Offer a back-to-school health or community fair in conjunction with a local school district. Work with local healthcare providers to offer free screenings at the health fair.
3. Provide safety identification for children and youth with serious chronic illnesses (medical bracelets or necklaces, etc.).
4. Organize a book or board game drive for a community center, children’s after-school center, hospital facility or school library.
5. Supply Braille and large print books for children who are blind or visually impaired.
6. Sponsor an activity day for individuals with developmental disabilities.
7. Prepare and send care packages to military personnel.
8. Remodel a children’s center or school room: paint, repair and landscape
9. Assemble and provide care packages for homeless shelters or other facilities.
10. Make baby supply kits for newborns in need.
11. Assist at camps serving children with special needs.

12. Refurbish used bicycles for children.
13. Organize a highway or park clean-up.
14. Provide safe soft teddy bear toys (no small, removable parts) to local emergency service professionals for presentation to children during an emergency.
15. Donate supplies for orphanages, foster children or other children and youth in need.
16. Collect and donate supplies to a local school.
17. Tutor at an after school program.
18. Paint a playground.
19. Volunteer at a senior citizen’s home.
20. Clean and repair a community center.
21. Plant a garden at a school.
22. Organize a job fair to help young people identify their career goals.
23. Implement a reading program at a school or library.
24. Host a wellness and nutrition day advocating healthy living habits for young people in your community.
25. Organize an alcohol/drug awareness seminar.

25 Project Ideas for Vision

1. Collect used eyeglasses and send them to the nearest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center.
2. Organize a braille, large print and audio book collection to benefit a local school, library or senior center.
3. Volunteer to create audio recordings of books and periodicals for people who are blind.
4. Work with local eye care professionals to provide a wide variety of community screenings including early childhood, school and all age’s vision screenings.
5. Utilizing the Lions Eye Health Program materials, host a public event to promote healthy vision and increase awareness of common eye diseases.
6. Sponsor a World Sight Day event.
7. Sponsor visually impaired students through camps, contests or other activities.
8. Create a community arts program for children and adults who are visually impaired.
9. Collaborate with an eye bank to promote the importance of corneal donations.
10. Develop a directory of community resources and services available for

people who are blind or have low vision.

11. Volunteer at a recreational camp, rehabilitation or vocational training center for children or adults who are blind or visually impaired.
12. Organize an inclusive sporting event for children with and without visual impairment.
13. Host a fundraiser to purchase and donate white canes to people who are blind or visually impaired in your community.
14. Work with local employers to develop an employee vision screening program.
15. Develop a coupon or voucher program with local optical shops for underserved populations to receive corrective eye wear at a reduced cost or for free.
16. Design a transportation program for school children, working adults and seniors who are blind or have low vision.
17. Host a "Beep Baseball" game or tournament.
18. Support a guide dog training program through fundraising or voluntary labor.
19. Develop an assistive technology library so people who have vision impairment can access resources as their needs change.
20. Create a sensory garden with plants, water features, and sculptures that engage the senses of touch, smell, hearing and taste. Provide braille or audio recordings of signage.
21. Partner with a school for the blind to support their curriculum, assistive technology and maintenance needs.
22. Partner with an orientation and mobility specialist to provide ongoing support to teachers of inclusive classrooms and employers of inclusive workplaces.
23. Provide vision exam and glasses to needy children
24. Host a holiday shopping trip for the blind
25. Sponsor a Blind Sports Team or Sporting Event

25 Project Ideas for Protecting our Environment

1. Develop an awareness campaign around environmental issues.
2. Plant trees or a community garden.
3. Help build a safe drinking water system.

4. Host seminars regarding simple practices that "Protect our Environment."
5. Organize a "Trash Mob" - a flash mob/race to pick up trash in a single location for a specific time (like 30 minutes).
6. Organize a beach or riverbank clean-up project.
7. Partner with your local environmental authorities to save an endangered animal, forest, or water source.
8. Organize a community-wide bike to work/school day.
9. Establish a school-wide recycling program
10. Conduct community-wide clean-up projects.
11. Raise awareness about the benefits of "going green."
12. Remove debris from a nature trail.
13. Recognize a local environmental leader.
14. Organize a battery/cell phone/computer recycling drive.
15. Sponsor a nature camp to teach youth about environmental preservation.
16. Sponsor an environmental preservation training program in partnership with park/forestry authorities for residents.
17. Work with a local school to organize a contest that will challenge students to offer creative solutions to solving environmental issues.
18. Volunteer at a recycling center.
19. Organize a roadside clean-up.
20. Clean up a park or playground.
21. Decrease your community's plastic waste consumption by encouraging others to use reusable water bottles and tote bags.
22. Encourage your club to participate in the LCI Environmental Photo Contest.
23. Host a community film screening and show an environmental film/documentary to raise awareness.
24. Gather clothing from your community members and donate them to a local shelter.
25. Create a sustainable community garden.

25 Project Ideas for Relieving Hunger

1. Sponsor a community food drive to replenish a local food pantry.
2. Volunteer to deliver prepared meals to elderly citizens.

3. Organize a feeding program at a local school to provide healthy, nutritious meals.
4. Prepare and deliver food baskets to families in need.
5. Serve meals at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
6. "Adopt" a family that is struggling to put food on their table. Take them shopping for fruits and vegetables.
7. Organize an event to benefit the food bank in your community; use cans of food as admission.
8. Hold a hunger walk and use proceeds to buy food for a children's orphanage or shelter.
9. Create snack packages to be distributed to children in need.
10. Collaborate with other service organizations in the community to take turns hosting a meal for needy people.
11. Partner with local restaurants or food markets. Pick up donations of fresh food items for a women's or children's shelter.
12. Create a cookbook of inexpensive, easy-to-make recipes.
13. Start a food co-operative to serve as a resource for healthy food at a more affordable price.
14. Accompany and assist a person who is blind with food shopping.
15. Collect infant formula and baby food for an organization serving young mothers at risk.
16. Provide a healthy snack or meal for a group of needy children who are in an after - school program.
17. Work with healthcare professionals to provide free classes on nutrition and food preparation.
18. Provide apples or another type of fruit as a healthy snack for children in childcare facilities.
19. Provide transportation for elderly residents so they can shop for food.
20. Teach children to bake a loaf of bread that they can take home to their family.
21. Invite a local food bank representative to speak at a club or district meeting.
22. Work with schools to provide needy children with backpacks supplied with food for periods when school is not in session.
23. Host a picnic or BBQ at a park for the local community.
24. Help local residents establish a community vegetable garden where they can grow their own food.
25. Arrange a demonstration of proper hand washing for local school children.

Governor Betty was inspired to take on a new project at the beginning of her year. I offered to research her idea and found that we can collect used prescription bottles and donate to the organization "Medical Bridges". They will sanitize the bottles and forward to 8 different countries to be used by medical personnel to distribute medication to patients as needed. The only thing we are required to do is take off the label with the patients name and medication. These will usually peel off pretty easy.

My club, Cut and Shoot Family Lions Club, have agreed to administer this project on behalf of our district. I would like to have a reminder put in the monthly newsletter to let our district know that collection of these bottles will be made at all PSC meetings for the new year. Our club will then be responsible for getting the bottles to "Medical Bridges".
