-One looking back and the other looking ahead.



The Challenge of Attracting New Younger Members

This is a pressing Problem throughout North America. However, for a moment reflect on the traditional family unit. Grandparents relate to grandchildren. Hence, the argument that our members do not relate to a younger generation is not true.

Service need not cost anything. In fact, when I think of elementary and middle school students, their greatest need is to be mentored by someone who cares and will spend time with them.

If we want to attract younger members, let's begin to serve their children. While vision screening is the go-to project, it is most likely not going to win the hearts of the parents. May I suggest that every club with an average age over 65 years, should adopt the following motto: **Lions In Our Neighborhood Schools**.

Begin with adopting a kindergarten Classroom. Regularly read to the students. Purchase classroom supplies. Meet the needs of those students who cannot afford a field trip. Become the Grandparent that some of the students need. Purchase books for the students. Be sure that the parents know everyone thing your club is doing for their child.

As we progress toward Middle School, the Lions Quest program becomes an option for increasing service to adolescent students. Maintaining the landscape. Going to sporting events or volunteering to take up tickets, run the concession stand, or usher, puts in front of perspective members, without engaging in back breaking activities which are beyond the capabilities of some of our more seasoned members.

In High School, we can begin LEO clubs. Retired Lions, who have mastered a trade, can volunteer to tutor students who are trying to learn a trade. And the list goes on...when we open our minds and step out of comfort zones.

It is all about proximity. Lions must begin to serve those that they wish to become members of their clubs. Serve a younger generation by impacting the lives of those that they love -their Children.

Service requires time, not money.
